News from The Chair

Another year and our thoughts may turn to new adventures.

As Certificate of Achievement and the Certificate in Advanced Textile Studies coordinator I have received a flurry of registrations and it is so very pleasing to see that members of our guilds are keen to further their skills.

How about another adventure, joining the GPC or the JEC? Nominations don't have to be with Mary England, AGWSD secretary until 10th February so you have plenty of time. If you miss the deadline don't worry, we are able to co-opt the right people, as long as we keep within the AGWSD constitution guidelines.

The GPC is not a band of elite people, not a band of those who are really brainy, just ordinary guild members who answered the call to help to run the organisation.

Are you good at organising, have experiences of planning and communicating, working as a team? Have you been on your own guild committee? The GPC really does require more members, rather urgently, to keep the whole organisation going. If you join in now you will have time to see how the organisation works, before taking on a specific role. Not that we haven't roles that require filling. One is for AGWSD event coordinator; someone to find venues for our major events, conference, summer school and national exhibition; to keep an ongoing record of the events, but not to be the event convenor. I do the event venue finding at the moment, which is great fun, but it would be so very good to have someone that will take on this vital role. Meanwhile, the AGWSD National Exhibition subcommittee recently met by zoom, and what a wonderful group they are. The Exhibition Information Pack will be sent to all guilds any day now. The title for the exhibition is 'Battles, Borders, Books', which comes from the venue themselves. For those of you who haven't been involved with the exhibition before, there are two parts. The non selected part, which this time will be a cover for a small notebook. (One of those covers that have an inside flap for inserting the notebook cover to hold it in place) The cover should involve spinning, weaving, dyeing or a combination of any of these and the construction can include other techniques too. Please send complete with a stapled or stitched slim notebook. The cover is to be inspired by the theme of 'Battles, Borders, Books'. The other part of the exhibition is the selected work which does not have to adhere to the theme. The first stage for this selected part, is to finish your item and to take as good a photograph as you can. Remember to create a 'feelie' piece, that is, a small sample that can be handled.

The photos and feelie pieces are looked at by the selectors. These are practitioners in the appropriate field, who make a decision as to whether an item would be suitable for the exhibition.

At this point I can hear some of you saying, 'my work is not good enough'. I will answer by saying that you won't know unless you enter. Over the years I have had work selected and hung, selected and not hung (it was too large for the available space), and work that has not been selected. I am not particularly expert at weaving, spinning or dyeing, but I give it a try.

This is just a brief summary, please read through the information pack that is sent to your guild secretary.

My Favourite Piece of Equipment - Janet Maher

I found this beauty at the house sale of a lady who had passed away. She had been a spinner all her life.

My Barnett skein winder sits proudly in my workroom and is used frequently, replacing the umbrella skein winder and my niddy noddy. (I still use these if I am out and about as they are easier to pack away). You probably will know of the Barnett drum carders, as I did, but I had never seen a skein winder made by David.



I wind my plied yarn directly from the bobbin and know that the plying twist I put into the yarn will be retained as there is no further twisting during the wind on.



The skein winder also measures the yarn automatically through the dials in the centre so I know all my skeins will be the same in length, and weight if my spinning is consistent. I put skeins on when I am turning them into balls for knitting and crochet and can wind a pirn directly too when weaving

I love equipment made from wood and this is very aesthetically pleasing to me. I got a bargain with the £25 I paid for it and hope to have years more use.

Colour Theory in Weaving

Devon Weavers Workshop with Margo Selby Friday 15th - Sunday 17th March 2024, cost £330

This workshop is designed to help you think about colour in the context of weaving. The suggested warps are designed to explore colour theory including the theories of contrast: light/dark, bright/neutral, complementary opposites, proportional contrast.

Students will set up their own looms for the workshop, a briefing document will be provided and students will choose from three warp suggestions:-Satin/Sateen – great for getting pure colour and stripes

Double cloth – in particular looking at polychromatic squares and warp/weft colour blending

Lampas – good for pure colour in warp and weft, technically challenging and good for weavers with experience.

Speakers List Update

A New Year and a lot of activity around the Speakers List.

Firstly, the biennial review has commenced, during which all speakers on the list are asked to review and update their entries as well as to share their activity over the past two years. Each entry, whether on the printable version of the list or on the online list, indicates if it has been reviewed (no changes made) or updated (some changes made) and recent Speaker activity recorded. So far about a third of the entries have been refreshed and it is hoped that this process will be completed within the next month to six weeks.

In addition, there are two new entries on the Speaker's List, each of which provides unusual but fascinating topics for talks or workshops.

Angharad Thomas is a lifelong knitter, both hand and machine, and has a very special and deeply researched interest in gloves. On retiring from a career in education and knitwear design she launched 'The Glove Project' in which she researched, designed and knitted gloves, traveling in the UK and Europe to visit museums and meet knitters. Angharad also knitted gloves in traditional patterns from the Yorkshire Dales and Sanquhar in southern Scotland as well as her own designs. In 2020 – 2021 she led the Holy Hands research project, funded by the Society of Antiquaries, which researched knitted liturgical gloves, resulting in a comprehensive database of these



with associated literature, research methods and reconstructions. Angharad offers fascinating talks on glove knitting as well as a workshop.



The Knitting & Crochet Guild (KCG) was founded in 1997and promotes the crafts of hand and machine knitting and crochet. They offer face-to-face and virtual talks giving an overview of the KCG, its remit, and what it offers members. They offer a history of the Guild, talks on its Collections, publications, and activities, all with a PowerPoint accompaniment. Other

talks can be arranged, including a trunk show with a selection of items from the Collection. These can be themed, from an introduction to the Collection or a more focused offering, e.g. traditional knits of the British Isles, Iace, Aran, machine knitting, or crochet for example.
