Note from the Editor

As many of you will be aware, there were no nominations for Chair at the recent AGM. The next General Purposes Committee meeting will be in July where we will confirm an acting chair who will be ratified at next year's AGM.

Meet the President, Mr Andrew Johnson

Hello all, I was asked to be the President last year and when I had picked myself off the floor I said 'yes'.

My textile journey started over 60 years ago. First learning to knit, then crochet, closely followed by learning a little about lacemaking before weaving and spinning came along. I joined the Kent Guild at the age of 11 and have not looked back since. Between my O and A level courses I spent the long summer vacation working in a weaving workshop in Northern Ireland weaving tweeds and rugs, and my degree course at West Surrey College of Art and Design allowed me to study weaving and lace. On leaving College I lectured on the embroideries in the Rachael Kay-Shuttleworth Textile collection at Gawthorpe Hall in Padiham, Lancashire. I then got involved in adult education, teaching weaving, lace, knotting and also the City and Guild Textile course. I later went out as Handicraft Advisor to St Helena in the South Atlantic, where they were making lace, embroidery and soft basketry along with other crafts. Unfortunately I found it hard to find an off island market for their produce. The island could only



produce a small quantity of any item which was not enough to supply the normal marketing systems. On my return to the UK two ecclesiastical commissions followed and I then moved to live in Northern Ireland which led to setting up an interior design business hand making curtains for large houses, drops of over three meters, interlined and hand sewn. I had the business up and running when I answered the call to serve in the church. I was ordained to the Church in Wales serving in Penarth on the outskirts of Cardiff. After finishing my curacy we moved to West Wales where we have been ever since. I have never stopped being a member of a Guild, I have served on the Journal Editorial Committee ending up in the chair, and the GPC as a Summer School coordinator and have taught at several Summer Schools. My own practice is as a weaver, spinner, dyer, lacemaker and embroiderer. I have specialised in ecclesiastical textiles but not exclusively. I love using the Theo Moorman Technique but have used a lot of different techniques over the years. I find that weaving is very 'Mindful' and much of my praying time is spent in beating out fabric.

My loom herd now includes an electronic Dobby and a draw loom, as well as several other floor and table looms, a couple of Marudai and a Takadai. My wife lets me admit to a dozen spinning wheels and I dare not count up the number of spindles dotted around the house!

For summer 2025, Ikon presents Thread the Loom, a group exhibition celebrating the art of weaving. An AVL Studio Dobby loom, on loan from Birmingham City University (BCU), will be activated through a series of micro-residencies with five West Midlands weavers Chantelle Folarin, Mahawa Keita, Clare Langford, Andrée Walker and Theo Wright, and international artist Seulgi Lee.

Textiles produced on the loom will be exhibited alongside work by contemporary artists Raisa Kabir, Alis Oldfield, Bharti Parmar, Dinah Prentice and Su Richardson.

Combining the tradition of hand weaving and computer -aided design, Thread the Loom invites the weavers and artists to exchange ideas, materials and structures that connect to the past in developing a sustainable future.



Speakers List Update

It was great to see one of our speakers, 'The Thread of Time', featured in the latest edition of The Journal (294 Summer 2025). In an article entitled "A Whorl, a Metal Detector and Three Reenactors: The Rediscovery of a lost European Spinning Tradition" the three members of this group describe how the discovery of a medieval spinning whorl led to research which enabled them to finally master a lost style of spindle spinning. Mary Cleaton, Alice Evans and Jane Hunt together make up 'The Thread of Time'. They are three of the most experienced distaff spinners, in the revived tradition, worldwide and are the only ones who currently teach in the UK. They offer Guilds both a talk and a workshop on distaff spinning, sharing all the knowledge they have accumulated through their research and practice. An experienced embroiderer and Temari artist, Nicola Davis enjoys stitching that blends symmetry with unexpected twists of colour. She believes embroidery is a unique medium through which to explore ancient traditions while expressing a modern experience of the world. Through The Twisted Thread, Nicola runs Temari workshops across the UK and online, to introduce people all over the world to the beautiful Japanese art of embroidered thread balls. A member of the Japanese Temari Association, Nicola has completed her Shihanka Nintei, or Level 3, certification, making her qualified to teach Temari. With

online participants including stitchers from Mexico to Japan, Scotland to the US, and in-person workshops including the Scottish Women's Institute's 2022 Evelyn Baxter Scholarship Class, Nicola has developed an international reputation for teaching the art of Temari, maintaining a focus on traditional techniques and while creating a fun, relaxed environment. She can tailor classes to groups of different sizes and abilities, ensuring everyone is able to discover the joy of Temari.
